Louise Alice Maud York, daughter of Frederick York and Catharine Williams, was born 25 Dec 1880 Meaford, Ontario and died 9 Jul 1913 Regina Saskatchewan

Married Edward Blake Quigley 2 Aug 1911 Punnichy, Saskatchewan

He was born prob 20 Aug 1872 Uxbridge, Ontario and died possibly Regina Saskatchewan

Attended the Nashville Bible School during the 1898-99. Listed as from Meaford, Ontario

Brother S. M. Jones of Nashville, Tennessee

U.S.A. arrived here Saturday January 1st, 1898 and commenced a meeting on Lord's day morning following. The following were baptized:

Canada Notes

Among the late arrivals at the Nashville Bible School from Meaford, Canada, are Mr. and Mrs. John Deegan, Mr. and Mrs. James Trout, Miss Maud York, Miss Emily Falls, W. F. Cox, and John Jay. W. E. Trout, who is in charge of the Commercial Department of the Bible School, came with his wife and child the last of September. From the city of St. Catharines we have Brother Ellis Claus, and from Carman, Manitoba, we have Brothers Stanley York and Norman Mallory. With Brother Whitfield, who has been here two terms, and Brother Mackie, we make up a fair representation from that part of the continent.

TUES. MAR. 14, 1899

Baking bread, ironing and packing three trunks the smallest. A house full of callers this afternoon I got to Lipscombs classes also Topic Emma & I went to Depot with John & Abbie & Maud train late John W Mallory Neal Mr & Mrs Chambers and our four boys there

Mary Williams Trout Diary, 1899



She was known as Maude or Alice Maude.

Like her brother, she was a student from Meaford at the 1898-99 session of the Nashville (TN) Bible School. When her parents moved west in 1890, she stayed in Carman MB, and in 1891 she was living with the Hills, attending school. She and her sister Verna attended Boyne School, about 4 miles from Carman. Maud later returned to Meaford where, in 1901, she was living with another aunt, Mary (Williams) Trout, while she was attending high school. In 1902 she went to Saskatchewan where she was a teacher until her marriage.*

In a letter to her "Uncle" John (actually her brother, John Henry Wilford York) and Aunt Mary dated 25 Apr 1913, she described the trip from their home in Wishart to Regina where she was to have her baby. If the baby was full term, she would have been about 7 months pregnant at the time.

I left home on Apr 11. We went to Punnichy in a big sleigh as we thought it would be much easier on me than the rough frozen prairie, but we had a hard time to find enough snow part of the way. Ed came with me. He left the horses at the livery for Mr. Perry to take home the next day.

We left Punnichy about 8:25 PM and arrived at Nokomis about 10 o'clock where we got a comfortable room. We stayed there till 10 the next morning and then came on to Bulyea. We had to change trains again but there was no wait so we arrived here at 2:40 PM. We found Ed's sister, brother, brother-in-law and nephew at the depot. I had a ride up to his sister's in their motor and then went to bed for a rest.

From her home in Wishart to Punnichy is about 25 miles. From there to Regina is about 65 miles as the crow flies but probably over 100 miles by the less direct train route

He [Ed Quigley] was a very shy man and requested a very short wedding ceremony.

Ed and Maud took over the old York homestead, built a frame house, and assumed the responsibility of caring for her parents in their declining years. Ed was one of the first trustees of the Perryville School when it opened in 1921. After the death of his wife and child he returned to Perryville where he remained for the rest of his life.—
