Norman H. Mallory was born in Meaford, Ontario, December 29, 1876; obeyed the gospel during the winter of 1893; and died at the home of his father, in Bates, Manitoba, September 16, 1899; ages twentytwo years, eight months, and seventeen days. Brother Mallory was a young man with bright prospects, and was a good, Christian He attended the Nashville Bible boy. School part of two years with the expectation of preaching the gospel of Christ, but was called home on account of the failure of his health, where he died but a short while after his return. He leaves many friends in the city of Nashville, as well as dear loved ones at home, to mourn his departure.
